

By donating these flags to the schools, your Blue Lodge generates goodwill and recognition of our Fraternity in your community. The Brothers from Mina #1456, Craig Hammons from Norton Moses #336, and Brian Haulotte from Texana #123 are pictured making donations on behalf of their Lodges.

In addition to the administrative responsibilities and paperwork in the General Secretary's office my service to the Fraternity includes correspondence and phone calls from our members and a surprising number of non-members requesting information or questions regarding the Scottish Rite. It is a challenge as some of the questions require responses that are not included in the General Secretary's instruction book.

My office has responded to requests from a neighborhood gentlemen whose father had passed away here in Austin but was a member of a Scottish Rite Valley in Florida. He had wanted a Scottish Rite or Masonic memorial ceremony as the remains were cremated and there was no burial. After verifying his status in Florida and getting approval from the Grand Lodge of Texas, the Brothers from Austin Lodge 12 graciously provided a touching ceremony for the Brother from Florida and his Family. The gentlemen who requested the ceremony was deeply touched and appreciative for our service and stated it was exactly what his father would have preferred. This gentlemen lives across the street from our Temple and has been to Theater productions but had never talked to Masons until then.

I often received requests from families asking to donate their relatives Masonic and Scottish Rite regalia as there were no male descendants to pass them on to. I have received many books, pins, caps, and on occasion, aprons. I have indicated to the families that we will find an appropriate home for these items and they will be deposited in a place of honor amongst our treasures. They have related that they are thrilled that someone might get some use out of them in the future.

I will have to say that one of my favorite activities related to the office of General Secretary is communicating with the members. I have heard so many great stories from fighter pilots who had served our country and was forced to parachute from his plane in Alaska to Brothers from other jurisdictions who are trying to find records of their grandfathers and great grandfathers who were Austin Scottish Rite members. I enjoy the conversations and interesting stories I have heard in my short service to the Valley.

Although the work is tedious at times, my reward is serving the membership and being associated with so many good Brothers. I have at times considered writing these stories down as a record of the rich life our Brothers have experienced. These are just some of the activities in the General Secretary's office that keep the job interesting and rewarding. I urge you to take time to listen and maybe write down some of the stories you hear.

IERAL OPERATIONS OF THE GENERAL SECRETA

Brethren,

A lot has happened to the Austin Scottish Rite Temple over the past five years!

In July of 2016, the Theater Board began the restoration of the auditorium's starry ceiling. Wall-to-wall scaffolding was erected, which was necessary for restoring the torn and stained fabric, dressing up the stars and double eagle with 24-karat gold leaf, and putting a fresh coat of paint on the new fabric. While we were at it, theater seats were reupholstered, a new control booth was built and the stage floor refinished.

Next came the blackened hardwood floors in the lobby. Theories abounded concerning whether to restore or replace, but ultimately the right person for the job was found, who patiently removed the accumulated layers of wax to reveal a resplendent parquet floor, practically in mint condition. Thus, the lobby regained its former elegance.

In 2018, the Board contracted Alamo Elevator Company to modernize the failing Otis elevator. The undersize elevator shaft precluded the use of a replacement elevator, so custom-made Hollister-Whitney pulleys and components were manufactured and meticulously installed, along with state-of-the-art digital controls and modern safety equipment. To cut costs, we kept the existing elevator car that had been generously refinished several years earlier by Illustrious Brother John Tolbert.

Additional projects came in 2019 and 2020, featuring the renovation and safety modernization of our commercial size kitchen and more recently, the Heritage Grant Project, which included painting, sealing and refinishing wood surfaces, as well as painting the entire exterior of the building, and the restoration of 13 original sash windows that had remained covered for the past 70 years.

Nearly \$1 million dollars has been spent on these projects over the past five years, while the Theater's cash and investment assets grew from about \$180,000 to over \$325,000—and impressively—the Theater has been able to operate in the black during the 2020 and 2021 budget years, despite being shuttered due to the Covid19 restrictions placed on public places.

On the horizon, the Board has approved a bid from HTS Austin to replace the Temple's aging HVAC system, which has been a thorn on our side for decades. The \$110,000 modernization project include new variable speed motor and fans, compressors, new tailor-made condenser coils that feature a bionic ionizer that uses a electromagnetic strip to destroys airborne pathogens including Covid19. This will be a great comfort for school districts when we renew our children's programing in the Fall. The new HVAC system will be completed in June 2021.

Brethren, these accomplishments are due to the hard work of the Board of Directors and the Theater's dedicated staff. These Brothers include Britt Kaufmann, Dennis Hill, Ron Roberts, Personal Representative Brian Vance, Raúl Scully, General Secretary Don Eames, Andrew Gray, and Emeritus Board Member Jim Wells. Our staff is led brilliantly by Producing Artistic Director Susan Gayle Todd and her dedicated assistants Deanna Belardinelli, Vicki Yoder, and June Podlech. The next time you run into any of them, Brethren, stretch out your hand and greet them warmly, and thank them for their commitment and dedication.

Finally, if you have not attended an Austin Scottish Rite Valley Stated Meeting in a while, do not miss the next opportunity to attend, so that you can enjoy the fellowship with your Brethren and see the many improvements made to the Temple.

SCOTTISH RITE DYSLEXIA FUNDATION UPDATE

First of all, I would like to thank all of the members of the Austin Valley for their support over the years and their continued support of the goals of the Scottish Rite Dyslexia Foundation (SRDF). As you may know, SRDF (formerly the Scottish Rite Learning Center) has not operated a brick-and-mortar school building since 2015. However, the proceeds of the sale of the building are still used to help children with learning disabilities. Today, SRDF continues to pursue its mission as a non-profit foundation by funding training and professional development for teachers and providing educational opportunities and therapies for children who are reading disabled.

Dyslexia is a learning disability that makes it difficult to read, write, and spell in spite of normal intelligence and adequate school instruction. It is caused by the brain's inability to process information received from the written word. Students with dyslexia need to be taught in a different way. The Scottish Rite Hospital has developed a highly regarded curriculum of dyslexia therapy instruction for teachers, known as "Take Flight." SRDF provides grants and scholarships for teachers to pursue certification in that and other specialized programs. Dyslexia cannot be cured, but it can be overcome, and properly trained teachers can provide our kids with hope for the future.

Children with dyslexia who have an opportunity to compensate for their impairments can grow to be quite successful. Some famous people you may have heard of who have dyslexia are Whoopi Goldberg, Steven Spielberg, Tim Tebow, Cher, and Henry Winkler. My own brother-in-law is dyslexic but he has earned a Ph.D. and speaks seven languages. Without the proper resources and support, dyslexia can often leave eager students feeling self-conscious and inadequate. Overcoming those impairments does require some specialized therapies and educational tools.

The Board of SRDF is committed to expanding those resources to help as many children as possible. Recently, our Board has added a school administrator and several new directors who are Scottish Rite Masons. We also hold fundraising activities, so watch for those.
